Bena's family were average folks living their lives, often under difficult circumstances – typhus, Stalin's purges, World War II, the totalitarianism of the Soviet Union and shortages of life's basic necessities – everything from milk to toilet paper. As Jews they also suffered from pogroms and endured severe and too-often violent anti-Semitism.

This family's story serves as a master narrative of sorts for the millions and millions of Jews and others living throughout the decades of the pre-Bolshevik Russian Empire as well as the Soviet Union. Along the way, we hope you will admire their pluck, smile and laugh at their antics and are moved by their stories and accomplishments.

After finishing the Kiev State University with a graduate degree in Russian Language she worked as a technical translator and editor.

In 1976, she immigrated to the United States with her husband and two young daughters. Her family was featured on the cover of the *Chicago Tribune* when her parents arrived one year later, as the 1,000th Soviet Jews to arrive to Chicago, their new home. A career change landed her in Information Technology in the US. In 2004, her family story project began. It spanned over 150 years and took eleven years to complete—and is now documented along with ongoing insights into Soviet culture and culture clash on appledoesnotfall.com. She is a wise and witty story teller, with deep insights into the impact of government and history and how they shape, influence and drive personal decisions that last for generations.
